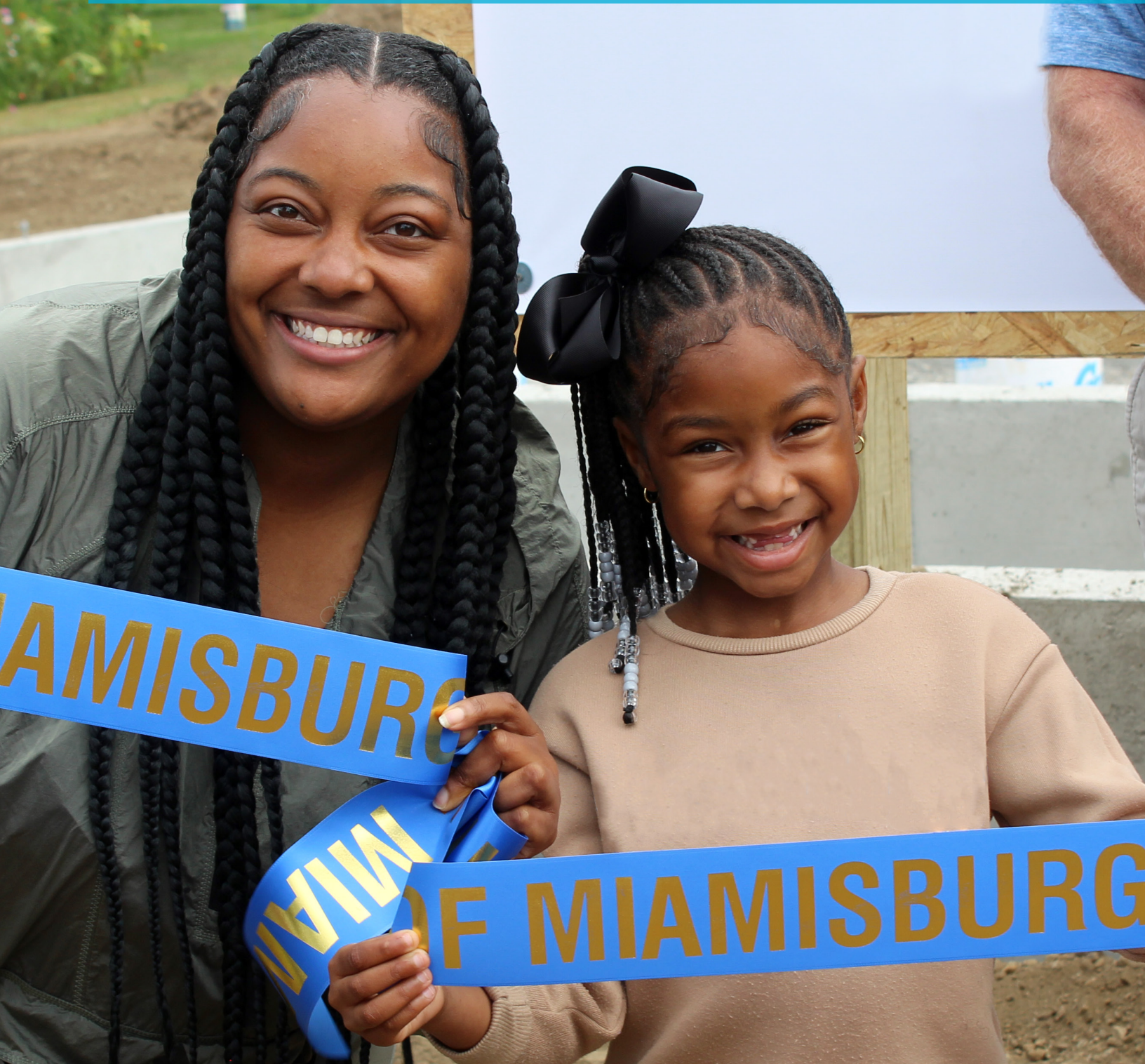

It all starts with a home



In 1983, Habitat for Humanity started building its first home in Dayton using a volunteer workforce dedicated to our mission of providing affordable homeownership. Every year since, volunteers from Clark, Greene, and Montgomery counties have continued building homes for mothers, fathers, children, grandparents and grandchildren. *A home is where hope becomes reality!*

In December 2025 and true to our mission, Gwendolyn, a mother and grandmother, bought her first home in Springfield, where she'll raise her 8-year-old granddaughter. I can only imagine what Christmas was like for Gwendolyn and her granddaughter! Some of my fondest Christmas memories are those I spent at my grandmother's house with my brothers, sisters, and cousins anticipating a visit from Santa! *A home is where memories are made and holidays are celebrated!*

Volunteers from across the Miami Valley helped us serve 112 families with homeownership opportunities and critical home

repairs. Students from Cliff Park High School in Springfield helped complete Gwendolyn's home. University of Dayton students and Wright State University students volunteered on our Flyer Nation Build and Raider Nation Build. Women Build team captains brought groups of friends and coworkers to build our 2025 Women Build home. Church groups gathered to help on our Faith Build. Volunteers from so many generous companies and organizations have picked up hammers to turn lumber and building materials into a home. *A home is where giving begins!*

In my current role as Executive Director, I don't spend as much time on the construction sites as I used to. But once a year, our Board of Directors and I have some fun working alongside each other, volunteering at one of the homes we have under construction. The physical work connects me to the house, since I can see what we completed. But as I look at rooms that will become a child's bedroom or a family room or kitchen for family to gather; as I walk around in the dirt that will soon be a back yard for games or birthday parties; as I look out windows at neighborhoods and children playing, I am reminded...

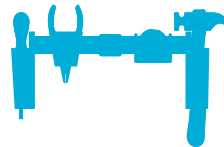
Dayton Habitat homeowners paid \$249,305 in property taxes in 2025.

As the 2025 Women Build homebuyer, Raneë returned to her roots in the Edgemont community where she grew up. After moving away as a young adult to build a life for herself, she is now coming in full circle, planting lasting roots in the place where it all started.

Raneë's journey is one of determination. She has been on her own since she was 19, working tirelessly to create a better future. She put herself through tech-associate school while balancing life's many challenges. Once she sets her mind to something, she follows through. Today, she finds fulfillment in her career as a medical assistant, a role that allows her to help others.

Giving back is second nature to Raneë. Throughout her time in Habitat's program, she found joy in helping others achieve their homeownership dreams. One of her most rewarding experiences was building a closet for another partner family's home, knowing that her work was making a lasting impact.

As a devoted mother of five, Raneë has faced her share of challenges. The family's past living situation has been far from ideal, with safety concerns preventing her younger children from freely playing outside. Every trip outdoors required constant vigilance, making it difficult for them to enjoy playtime.

But all of that has changed. With the help of Habitat for Humanity of Greater Dayton and the supporters of the Women Build program, Raneë's dream of homeownership is a reality!

108 Families impacted by Critical Repairs in 2025

In 2025, Habitat for Humanity of Greater Dayton completed critical repairs on 108 homes.

Serving primarily seniors and veterans, these repairs allow families of limited income to remain in their homes and age in place. The repairs made to their homes are done at low or no cost to the homeowner.

Repairs like furnace and hot water heater replacements, roof repairs, wheel chair ramps, or even just widening a doorway into a bathroom for wheelchair access can make a difference in someone's life.

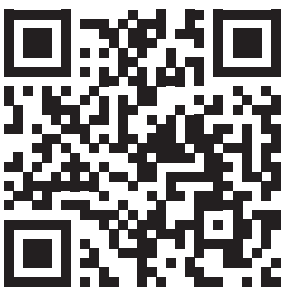
Critical Repair Story - Meet Zoe



Did you know that Habitat for Humanity of Greater Dayton offers critical home repairs? These repairs help homeowners age with dignity in their homes and preserve affordable housing. Zoe, an 83-year-old widow, has called her house in Dayton home for more than 60 years. Until a recent accident limited her mobility, she lived an active and independent life. Today, that independence is challenged by the steep stairs that separate her from her bedroom and only bathroom upstairs. While her kitchen and main living spaces are downstairs, navigating the stairs has become increasingly difficult.

Zoe is the life of the party and still has her spirit! Despite her mobility challenges, Zoe still drives, cherishes time on her front porch, and remains determined to continue living in the home she treasures. She often says she will live out her days there, surrounded by the memories she has built over decades.

Thanks to Habitat's Critical Repair program, a custom stairlift gave Zoe the ability to safely move between floors, preserving her independence and allowing her to enjoy the home she loves for many more years!

University Builds



Bringing school spirit to the neighborhoods we serve

In 2023, the University of Dayton School of Business Administration partnered with Habitat for Humanity of Greater Dayton for the first UDSBA Panel Build during Welcome Weekend. This panel build led to the construction of the first home built in the Edgemont community in over 50 years. This build was branded as the Flyer Nation Build and encouraged UD students, staff, alumni and supporters to make a difference in their community. Since 2023, three UDSBA panel builds have taken place and two new homes have been built behind UD arena.



In Spring 2025, the Wright State University Athletics Department hosted a panel build as a service project for the student-athletes. Despite the rain, over 200 athletes built the panels for the first Raider Nation Build, which will be completed in 2026. The partnership with the Athletics Department led to another panel build in the fall during move in weekend for the first year students.

Both Universities are committed to creating community minded professionals. Whether you're a Raider, a Flyer or neither, housing is an issue that everyone can get behind!

Gwendolyn came to Dayton looking for a fresh start to create something new for herself and her 8-year-old granddaughter. When she called 211 for housing support, she learned about Dayton Habitat. After nearly 600 sweat equity volunteer hours, Gwendolyn is a homeowner!

A former employee at Miami Valley Head Start, Gwendolyn retired due to severe arthritis. Her new home is more than just a house; it is an accessible space, giving Gwendolyn the ability to live independently. Her old apartment had stairs, making daily life challenging. She often had to roll items down the steps or ask for help. Now she lives in a home that is made for her.

During her volunteer hours, Gwendolyn enjoyed helping at the Springfield ReStore and discovering all the unique donations that came through the doors. A woman of deep faith, Gwendolyn is a prayer facilitator and retired jail chaplain from Clark County Jail. Her dedication to service is something she carries into every part of her life.

Habitat was excited that Gwendolyn and her family would move into their new home just in time for Christmas!

Meet Len & Alicia



Homeownership was a long-standing dream for Len and Alicia. For over eight years, their son had been sleeping on the living room couch in their small two-bedroom rental. With limited space, the need for a permanent, spacious home became increasingly urgent.

Len, a proud U.S. Navy veteran who served aboard the U.S.S. Independence during the Vietnam War, has faced his share of battles. His exposure to Agent Orange led to serious health complications. Medical expenses strained the family's finances, setting back their plans for homeownership. But Len is a fighter—now in remission and focused on regaining his strength, he was ready to turn the page to a brighter chapter.

It was by chance that Len and Alicia came across an article about Habitat and discovered Habitat's unique approach to homeownership through partnering and offering 0% interest mortgages. Eager to embrace the opportunity, Len and Alicia threw themselves into the process.

The couple's dedication to bettering their lives has always gone hand-in-hand with serving others. For years, the family has volunteered together at other organizations. Through this work, Len and Alicia have modeled the values of service, gratitude, and compassion—principles they strive to pass on to their children.

Their kids are thriving students who love playing basketball. The move meant more than just space—it was a fresh start, a quiet place to study, a home where each family member can grow.

"We are more than grateful for this opportunity," Len and Alicia share. "Being selected as a Habitat Partner Family has changed our lives!"

Meet Mr. Dorsey

At 106 years old, Mr. Dorsey has lived a long, remarkable life. A proud U.S. Army veteran, he served his country for four years during World War II. After his service, he settled into his home in Dayton, a place he has now cherished for 51 years.

In this quiet, beautiful neighborhood where many senior residents have found comfort, Mr. Dorsey has always felt safe. “It’s home,” Mr. Dorsey’s daughter, Sandy, explained. “It’s where he’s comfortable, where his memories are.” For that reason, moving elsewhere was never an option; but when his home’s roof began to fail, his sense of peace was suddenly threatened.

Cracks and leaks in the ceiling had worsened over time, eventually allowing water to run behind the walls. The sound was constant, and the damage was growing. For Mr. Dorsey, who lives with low vision, these conditions posed even greater risks.

Sandy knew something had to be done. After 29 years of serving Dayton Public Schools, working with special needs teens before retiring, she is no stranger to advocating for those she loves. When a neighbor told her about Habitat for Humanity of Greater Dayton’s Critical Repair Program, she immediately reached out.

By a stroke of good fortune, or perhaps fate, the Critical Repair team had just received funding specifically to help veterans. It was perfect timing to help Mr. Dorsey.

Habitat for Humanity of Greater Dayton provides critical home repairs at no cost to homeowners in need. These repairs range from roof replacements and furnace repairs to accessibility modifications, allowing residents to remain safe and independent in their homes.

Thanks to this program, Mr. Dorsey received a brand-new roof, stopping the leaks and protecting his home from further damage. The repair not only secured the structure of his house but also restored a deep sense of security for both him and Sandy.

“We’re praying for more people to be blessed through this program,” Sandy said, her voice full of gratitude.

For Mr. Dorsey, the home where he has spent more than half a century can now continue to be the safe haven he loves. For Sandy, it’s a relief to know her father can remain in comfort, right where he belongs.

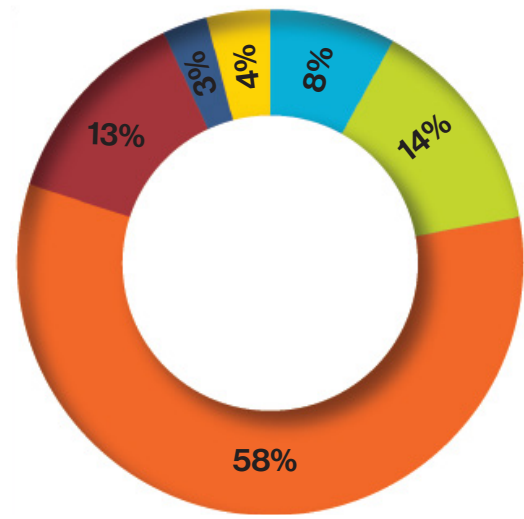

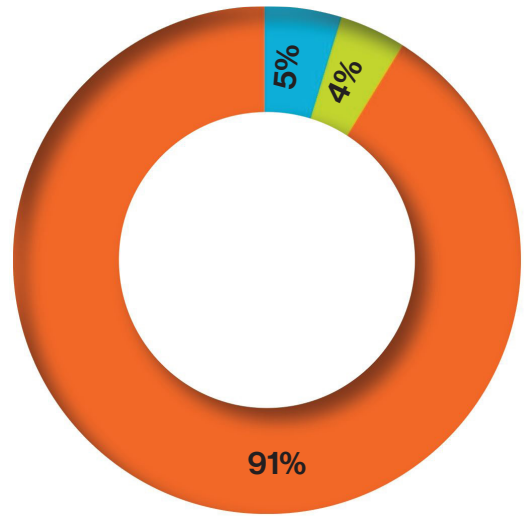
